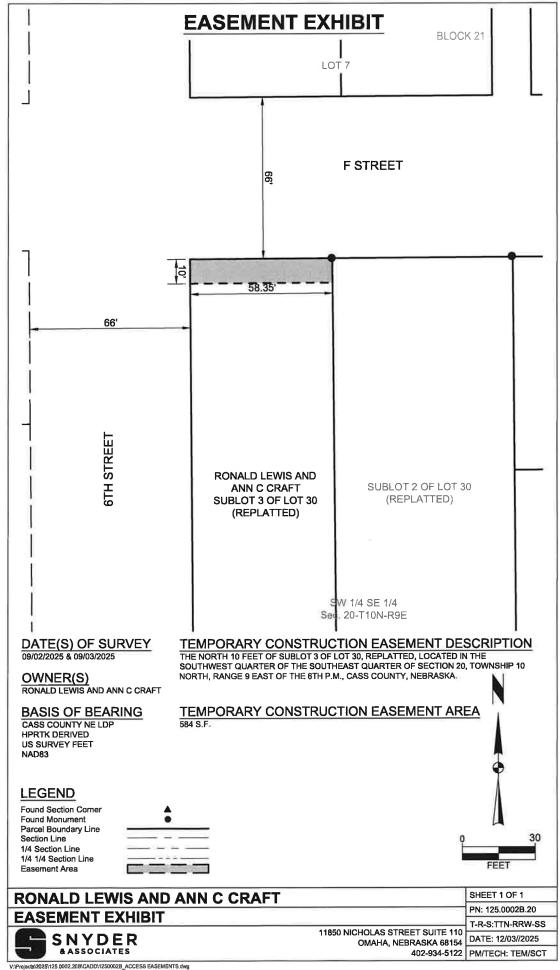

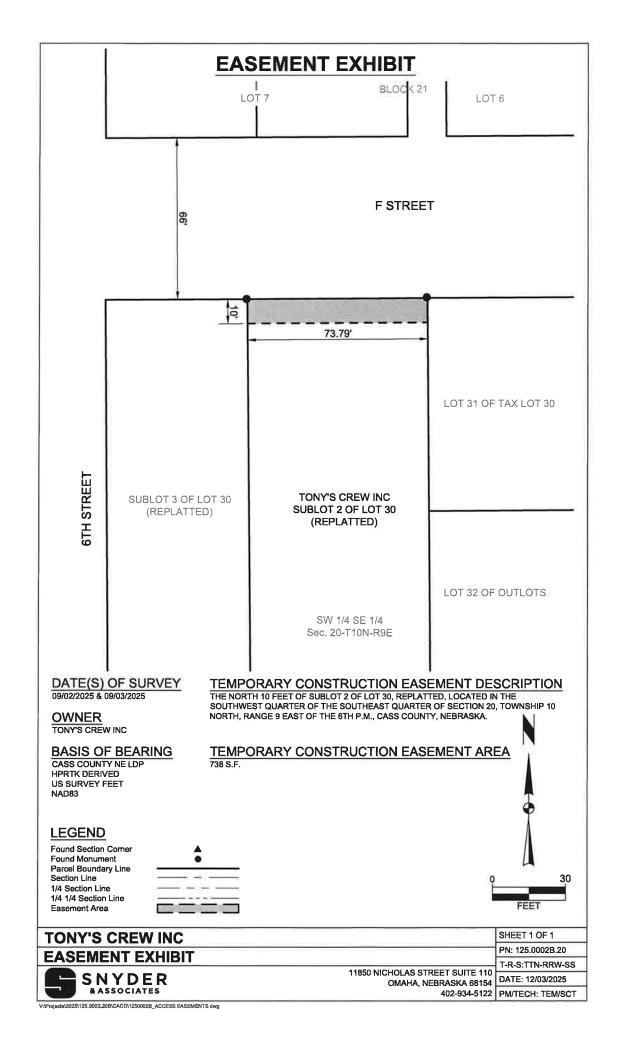

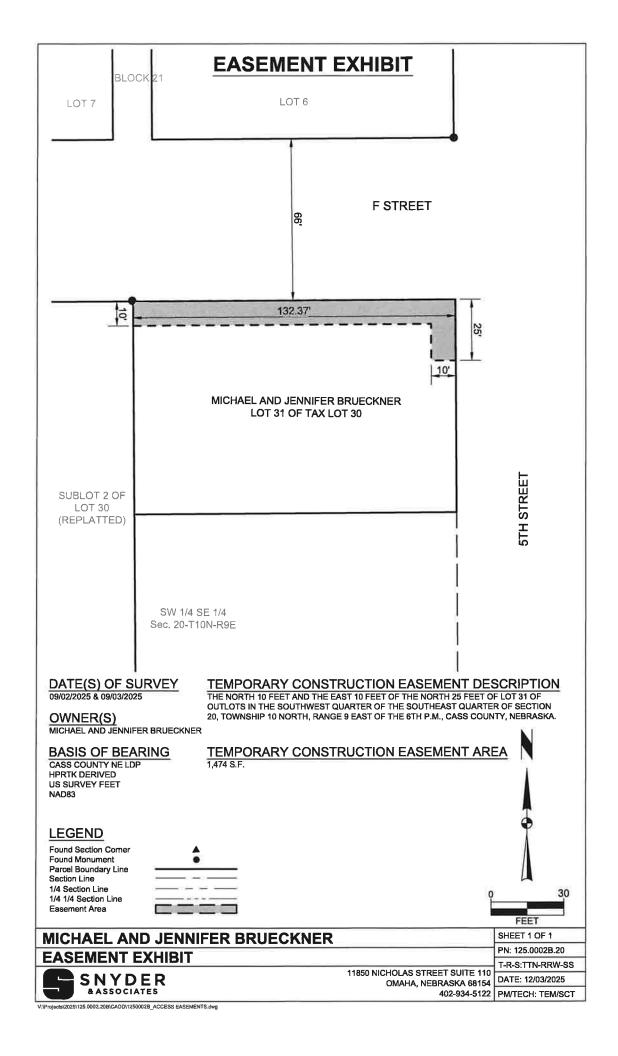
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Eagle, Nebraska, as follows:

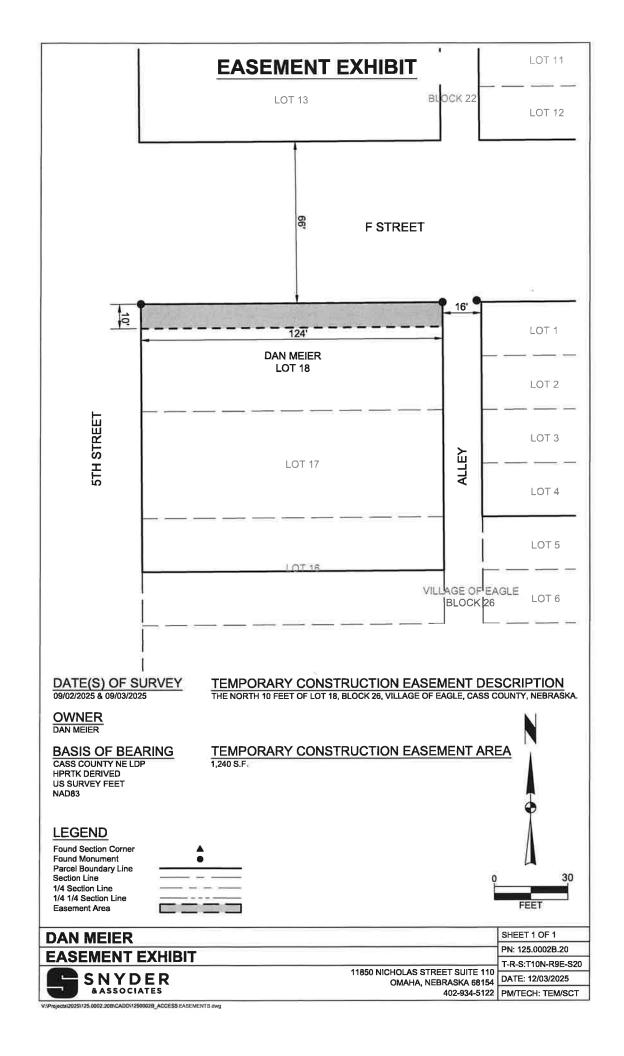
- 1. That the findings here and above made should be and are hereby made a part of this Resolution as fully as if set out at length herein.

- 3. That the Village Clerk, Engineer and Village Attorney have the authority to facilitate the acquisition of the Easements in order to proceed with the project.

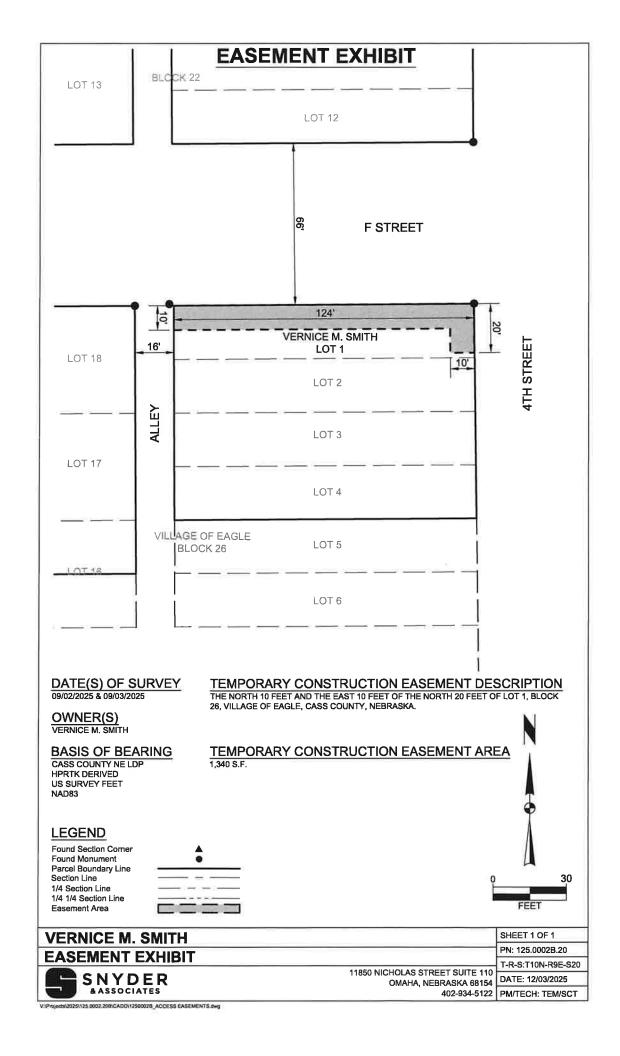

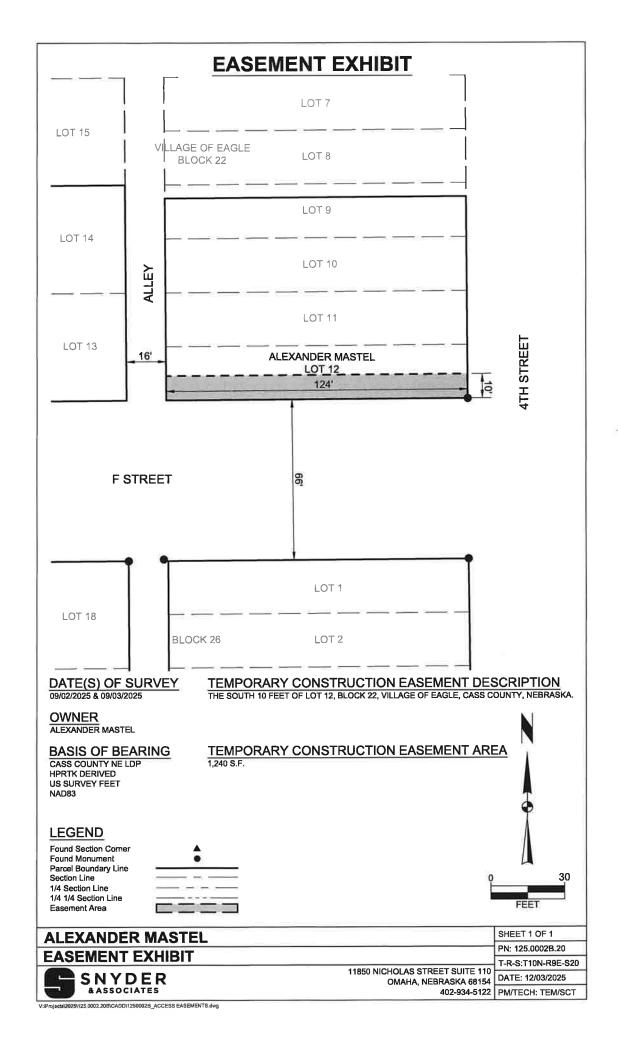


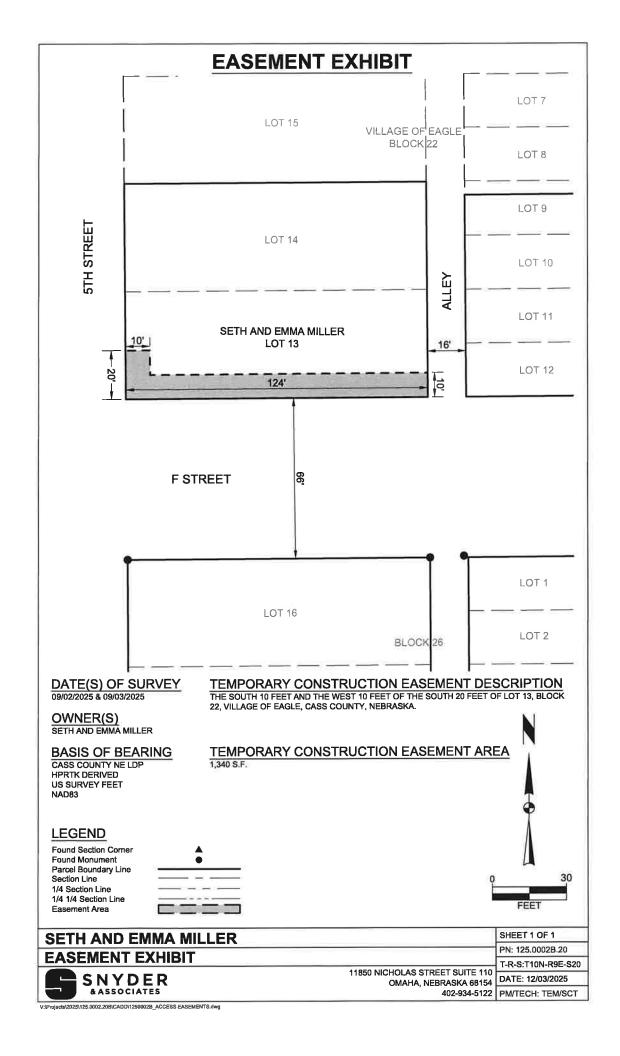


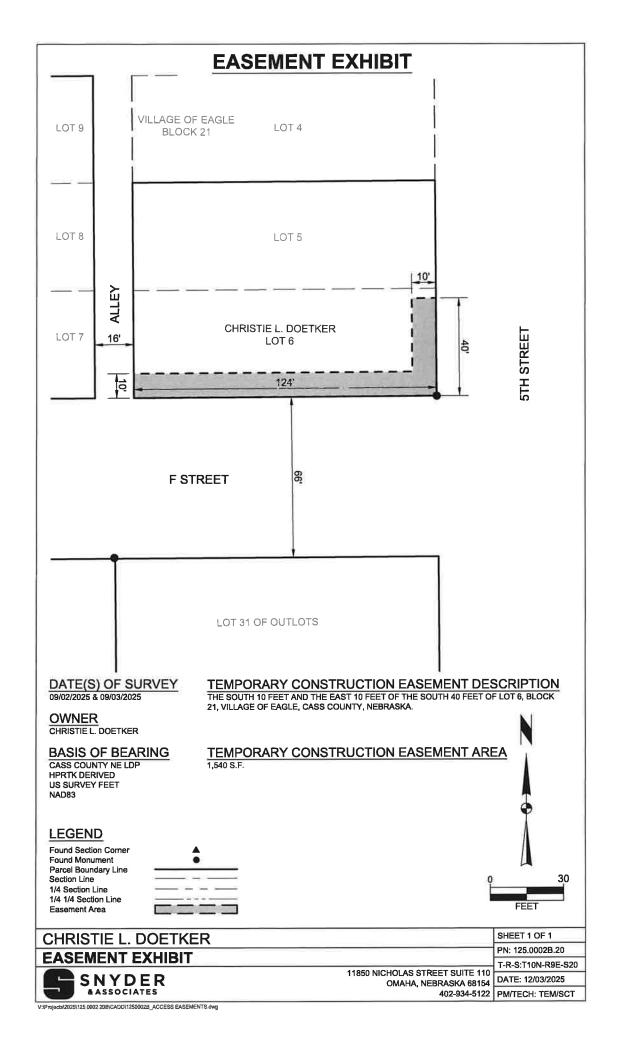


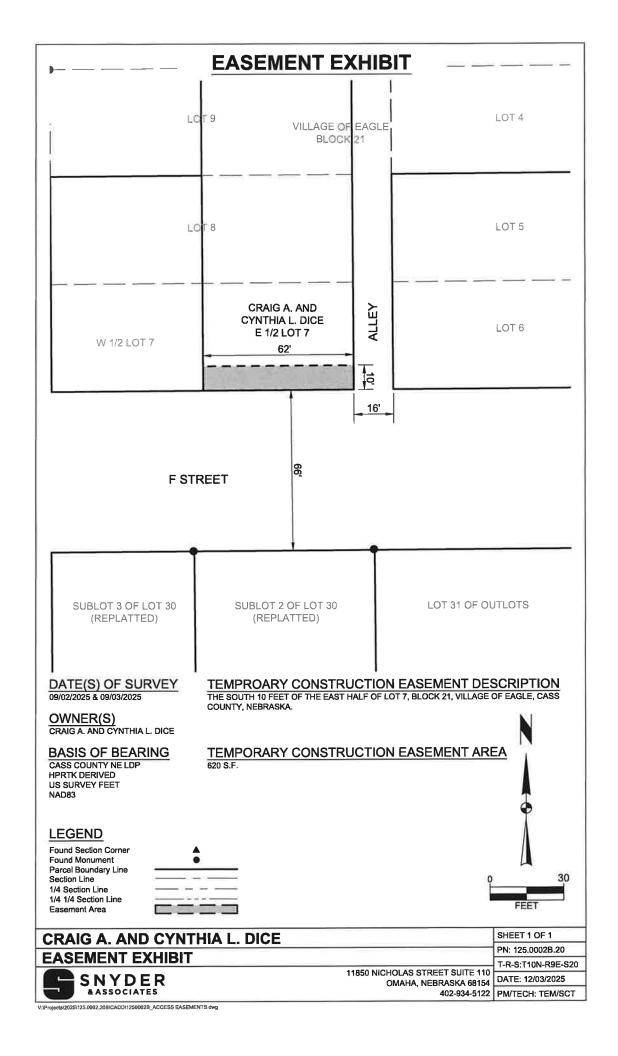


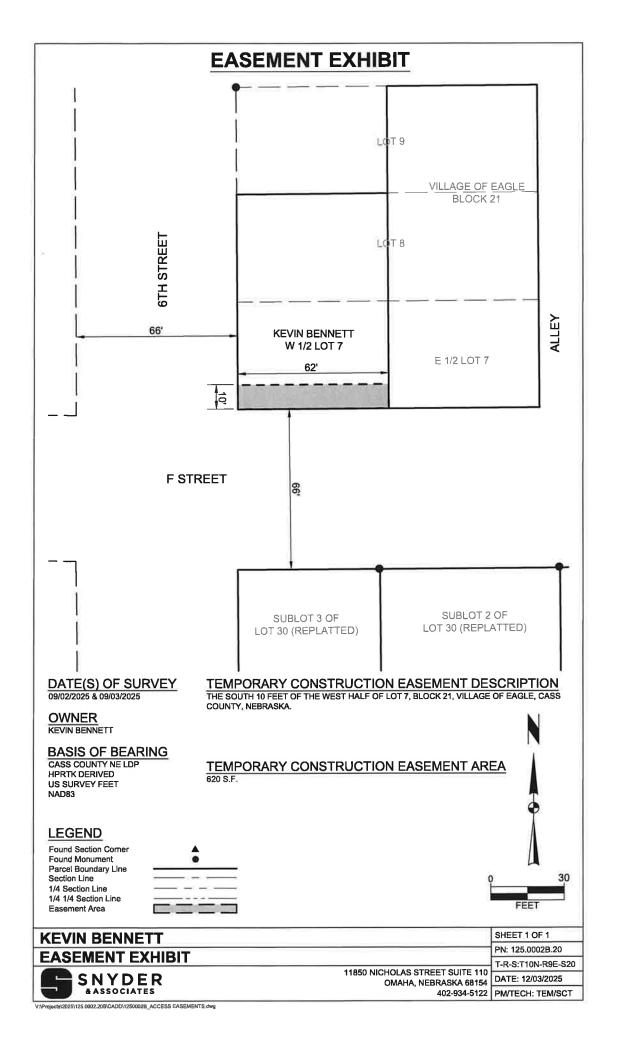












ORDINANCE NO. 2025-12

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, CASS COUNTY, NEBRASKA, TO AMEND CHAPTER 10, ARTICLE 1, SECTION 10-117, OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA AS THE SAME RELATES TO THE HOURS OF SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WITHIN THE VILLAGE'S ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT CORPORATE LIMITS; TO REPEAL ALL HEREWITH; TO PROVIDE FOR THE SEVERABILITY OF ANY SECTION, CLAUSE, PROVISION OR PORTION FOUND UNCONSTITUTIONAL OR INVALID; TO PROVIDE THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE PUBLISHED AND SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND TAKE EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE AND APPROVAL, AS PROVIDED BY LAW AND AS PROVIDED HEREIN; AND TO PROVIDE THAT THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BECOME AND BE MADE A PART OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA. AND THE SECTIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE MAY BE RENUMBERED TO ACCOMPLISH SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Eagle, Nebraska has received a recommendation to amend Eagle Municipal Code Section 10-117 of Chapter 10, Alcoholic Beverages, Hours of Sale, to expand the hours of permissible sales of alcoholic liquors sold at retail or dispensed for consumption on or off premises to include the hours of 6:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon on Sundays; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Eagle, Nebraska also finds it to be in the best interest of the Village to amend Eagle Municipal Code Section 10-117 of Chapter 10, Alcoholic Beverages, Hours of Sale, to expand the hours of permissible sales of alcoholic beverages sold at retail for consumption off the premises to include the hours of 1:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. on any day.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 10, Article 1, Section 10-117 of the Village of Eagle, is amended as indicated:

SECTION 10-117: HOURS OF SALE

1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons or their agents to sell any alcoholic beverages, for consumption off the premises, within the Village except during the hours provided herein:

6:00 A.M. to 1:00 2:00 A.M. of the following day. 6:00 A.M. to 2:00 A.M.

Sundays Off Sale

12:00 Noon 6:00 A.M. to 2:00 A.M. of the following day.

Beer and Wine

Said hours of sale shall only apply to those holding an appropriate and lawful liquor license of the State of Nebraska.

- 2. No person shall consume any alcoholic beverages on licensed premises for a period of time longer than 15 minutes after the time fixed in this section for stopping the sale of alcoholic beverages on the premises.
- 3. For the purposes of this section, "on sale" shall be defined as alcoholic beverages sold by the drink for consumption on the premises of the licensed establishment, "off sale" shall be defined as alcoholic beverages sold at retail in the original container for consumption off the premises of the licensed establishment.
- 4. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit licensed premises from being open for other business on days and hours during which the sale or dispensing of alcoholic beverages is prohibited by this section.
- Section 2. All other ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
- Section 3. That should any section, paragraph, sentence or word of this ordinance be declared for any reason invalid and/or unconstitutional, it is the intent of the Board of Trustees that it would have passed all other portions of this Ordinance independent of the elimination herefrom of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

The Village Board of Trustees met in regular session at 7:00 p.m. on December 2, 2025 with Todd, Hochstein, Meier, Dobbins and Surman present. The Agenda items listed thereon were sufficiently descriptive to give the public reasonable notice of the matters to be considered at the meeting. The Chairperson, at the beginning of the meeting, informed the public about the location of the posted current copy of the Open Meetings Act. Chairperson Todd named the three (3) areas where the agenda was posted as follows: Eagle Municipal Building, Eagle Fire & Rescue Department and Eagle Municipal Park. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Chairperson Todd opened the public hearing at 7:01 p.m. for the purpose of hearing testimony concerning Sidewalk Improvement District No. 2025-01, the outer boundaries of which shall include all of the property abutting F Street, from 4th to 6th Street, to be improved by the construction of sidewalks and the improvement of sidewalk space. The Village Engineer, Barbara Johnston, and her colleague Sam Tomek, were present to help answer questions from the public. An exhibit was displayed showing the proposed roadway and sidewalk improvements in this district. Todd asked if there were any comments or questions from the public. Cindy Dice (530 F St.) asked how far the sidewalks will be set back onto the property. Johnston said sidewalks will typically be located five feet (5') from the edge of the street in the right-of-way area. Dice asked if the large tree on her lot will need to be removed. Johnston said it is difficult to tell from the current exhibit; the assumption is grading will need to occur all the way back to the property lines, but if there isn't a significant change in elevation, the tree may be saved; however, if the tree is in the right-of-way area it will likely be in danger of removal. Dice asked who would pay to have the tree removed. Johnston said that would be an expense of the Village as part of the construction project. Dice asked if the drainage tube adjacent to her front yard will be removed as part of the construction cost as well. Johnston said yes. The Village Attorney, Maureen Freeman-Caddy, said driveways will also be poured back to the property line, and if a property owner is interested in having their entire driveway done concurrently, they may be able to make independent arrangements with the contractor. Craig Dice (530 F St.) said his driveway and the alleyway are side-by-side; the exhibit shows a green space between the two and he does not believe there will be enough room for it. Tomek said the alleyway is not currently in the correct location so the driving surface will be shifted to the east. Dice said he would be fine if his driveway and alleyway were connected with concrete instead of having the small green space between the two. Josh Lahmon (245 S. 4th St.) said he believes a precedent was set in the past where residents were not charged for sidewalks as part of a Sidewalk Improvement District. Freeman-Caddy said there was only one instance where sidewalks were not assessed against the adjacent properties; this was the 4th Street ADA Improvements Project (D Street to F Street); the Village Board at that time deemed this particular project a public benefit project since it encompassed the downtown business district. Lahmon said his argument is all sidewalks are installed for public benefit and some of the sidewalks that were not assessed during the last 4th Street Project were adjacent to residential properties.

The public hearing was closed at 7:12 p.m.

Chairperson Todd opened the public hearing at 7:13 p.m. for the purpose of hearing testimony concerning Sidewalk Improvement District No. 2025-02, the outer boundaries of which shall include all of the property abutting 4th Street, from A Street to the MoPac Trail, to be improved by the construction of sidewalks and the improvement of sidewalk space. The Village Engineer, Barbara Johnston, and her colleague Sam Tomek, were present to help answer questions from the public. An exhibit was displayed showing the proposed roadway and sidewalk improvements in this district. Todd asked if there were any comments or questions from the public. Josh Lahmon (245 S. 4th St.) said he believes a precedent was set in the past where residents were not charged for sidewalks as part of a Sidewalk Improvement District. He also asked if there is an estimated cost to each property owner because he feels there are individuals in this district that may not have the funds to afford the assessment. Nystrom said the total pre-design opinion of probable cost for sidewalks in this district was estimated at \$55,000. Johnston said her estimate would be between \$3,000-\$4,000 per 100' of frontage. Meier expressed concern that residents may not know they will be charged for sidewalks. Freeman-Caddy said that is the reason notices were sent to all affected property owners in each district. Deb Carter (205 S. 4th St.) said she also feels there will be property owners in the district that have difficulties with the assessment. Freeman-Caddy said that is part of the reason the Village Board is allowing interest-free annual payments over the course of seven years. Carter said she has an existing sidewalk and asked if it will need to be replaced. Johnston said the sidewalk will need to be replaced and relocated further to the east. Lahmon said there is a maximum allowable width for a driveway approach and asked if any that are currently over the limit will be poured back as they were or corrected to meet the allowable limit. Johnston said the plans are currently drawn to put back what is in existence.

The public hearing was closed at 7:23 p.m.

Motion by Surman, second by Meier, to introduce Resolution 2025-14. Voting: Ayes – 5. Motion carried.

A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT THE WRITTEN OBJECTIONS TO THE CREATION OF SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NOS. 2025-01 AND 2025-02 OF THE VILLAGE (COLLECTIVELY, THE "DISTRICT") ARE INSUFFICIENT AND THAT THE REQUIRED FACTS AND CONDITIONS FOR THE CREATION OF THE DISTRICT

EXIST; RATIFYING AND AFFIRMING THE CREATION OF THE DISTRICT; ACCEPTING AND APPROVING THE PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATE OF COSTS OF THE ENGINEERS OF THE VILLAGE IN CONNECTION WITH THE DISTRICT IMPROVEMENTS AND AUTHORIZING VILLAGE OFFICIALS TO ENTER INTO AND EXECUTE A CONTRACT FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENTS ON BEHALF OF THE DISTRICT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHAIRPERSON AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES (THE "VILLAGE BOARD") OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA (THE "VILLAGE") AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Village Board makes the following findings and determinations:

- a. Pursuant to Ordinance Nos. 2025-09 and 2025-10, adopted by the Village Board on October 20, 2025 ("Creation Ordinance"), the Village created Sidewalk Improvement District Nos. 2025-01 and 2025-02 (collectively, the "District") and authorized the construction and improvement of sidewalks within (i) F Street from 4th to 6th Street, and (ii) 4th Street from A St. to the Mopac Trail, all within the Village (as more fully described in the Creation Ordinance, the "Improvements"); and
- b. Pursuant to the Creation Ordinance, the Village Board called for a public hearing to be held on December 2, 2025 (the "Public Hearing") for the Village Board to determine the sufficiency of any written objections filed objecting to the creation of the District and the existence of the required facts and conditions relative to the creation of such District, and the Village Board ordered notice of the Public Hearing to be published as provided by law; and
- c. Notice of the creation of the District and notice of the Public Hearing was published once each week for two consecutive weeks, on November 6 and November 13, in *The Voice News*, a legal newspaper of general circulation in the Village; and
- d. As of the date of the Public Hearing, owners of record title representing 0% of the front footage of the property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in District No. 2025-01 and 9.48% of the front footage of the property directly abutting the Improvements to be made in District No. 2025-02 have filed written objections to the creation of such District; and
- e. The owners of record title to property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in the District who filed objections to the creation of such District do not represent more than 50 percent of the front footage of property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in the District; and

- f. The Village Board finds and determines that (i) objections to the creation of the District are insufficient to repeal the Creation Ordinance, and (ii) all required facts and conditions exist for the creation of the District.
- **Section 2**. The creation of the District and the Village Board's findings and determinations with respect to the construction of the Improvements are hereby ratified and affirmed.
- **Section 3.** The plans, specifications and estimates of cost of the engineers in connection with the construction of the Improvements in the District, which have heretofore been filed with the Village Board are accepted and approved.
- **Section 4**. This Resolution shall be in full force and take effect from and after its passage as provided by law.

SERIES 2025, OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA, IN ONE OR MORE SERIES AND IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED TWO MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,800,000), TO PROVIDE INTERIM FINANCING FOR THE COSTS OF CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING STREETS. VILLAGE OF EAGLE

December 2, 2025

The Village Board of Trustees met in regular session at 7:00 p.m. on December 2, 2025 with Todd, Hochstein, Meier, Surman and Dobbins present. The Agenda items listed thereon were sufficiently descriptive to give the public reasonable notice of the matters to be considered at the meeting. The Chairperson, at the beginning of the meeting, informed the public about the location of the posted current copy of the Open Meetings Act. Chairperson Todd named the three (3) areas where the agenda was posted as follows: Eagle Municipal Building, Eagle Fire & Rescue Department and Eagle Municipal Park. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Chairperson Todd opened the public hearing at 7:01 p.m. for the purpose of hearing testimony concerning Sidewalk Improvement District No. 2025-01, the outer boundaries of which shall include all of the property abutting F Street, from 4th to 6th Street, to be improved by the construction of sidewalks and the improvement of sidewalk space. The Village Engineer, Barbara Johnston, and her colleague Sam Tomek, were present to help answer questions from the public. An exhibit was displayed showing the proposed roadway and sidewalk improvements in this district. Todd asked if there were any comments or questions from the public. Cindy Dice (530 F St.) asked how far the sidewalks will be set back onto the property. Johnston said sidewalks will typically be located five feet (5') from the edge of the street in the right-of-way area. Dice asked if the large tree on her lot will need to be removed. Johnston said it is difficult to tell from the current exhibit; the assumption is grading will need to occur all the way back to the property lines, but if there isn't a significant change in elevation, the tree may be saved; however, if the tree is in the right-of-way area it will likely be in danger of removal. Dice asked who would pay to have the tree removed. Johnston said that would be an expense of the Village as part of the construction project. Dice asked if the drainage tube adjacent to her front yard will be removed as part of the construction cost as well. Johnston said yes. The Village Attorney, Maureen Freeman-Caddy, said driveways will also be poured back to the property line, and if a property owner is interested in having their entire driveway done concurrently, they may be able to make independent arrangements with the contractor. Craig Dice (530 F St.) said his driveway and the alleyway are side-by-side; the exhibit shows a green space between the two and he does not believe there will be enough room for it. Tomek said the alleyway is not currently in the correct location so the driving surface will be shifted to the east. Dice said he would be fine if his driveway and alleyway were connected with concrete instead of having the small green space between the two. Josh Lahmon (245 S. 4th St.) said he believes a precedent was set in the past where residents were not charged for sidewalks as part of a Sidewalk Improvement District. Freeman-Caddy said there was only one instance where sidewalks were not assessed against the adjacent properties; this was the 4th Street ADA Improvements Project (D Street to F Street); the Village Board at that time deemed this particular project a public benefit project since it encompassed the downtown business district. Lahmon said his argument is all sidewalks are installed for public benefit and some of the sidewalks that were not assessed during the last 4th Street Project were adjacent to residential properties.

The public hearing was closed at 7:12 p.m.

Chairperson Todd opened the public hearing at 7:13 p.m. for the purpose of hearing testimony concerning Sidewalk Improvement District No. 2025-02, the outer boundaries of which shall include all of the property abutting 4th Street, from A Street to the MoPac Trail, to be improved by the construction of sidewalks and the improvement of sidewalk space. The Village Engineer, Barbara Johnston, and her colleague Sam Tomek, were present to help answer questions from the public. An exhibit was displayed showing the proposed roadway and sidewalk improvements in this district. Todd asked if there were any comments or questions from the public. Josh Lahmon (245 S. 4th St.) said he believes a precedent was set in the past where residents were not charged for sidewalks as part of a Sidewalk Improvement District. He also asked if there is an estimated cost to each property owner because he feels there are individuals in this district that may not have the funds to afford the assessment. Nystrom said the total pre-design opinion of probable cost for sidewalks in this district was estimated at \$55,000. Johnston said her estimate would be between \$3,000-\$4,000 per 100' of frontage. Meier expressed concern that residents may not know they will be charged for sidewalks. Freeman-Caddy said that is the reason notices were sent to all affected property owners in each district. Deb Carter (205 S. 4th St.) said she also feels there will be property owners in the district that have difficulties with the assessment. Freeman-Caddy said that is part of the reason the Village Board is allowing interest-free annual payments over the course of seven years. Carter said she has an existing sidewalk and asked if it will need to be replaced. Johnston said the sidewalk will need to be replaced and relocated further to the east. Lahmon said there is a maximum allowable width for a driveway approach and asked if any that are currently over the limit will be poured back as they were or corrected to meet the allowable limit. Johnston said the plans are currently drawn to put back what is in existence.

The public hearing was closed at 7:23 p.m.

FACTS AND CONDITIONS FOR THE CREATION OF THE DISTRICT EXIST; RATIFYING AND AFFIRMING THE CREATION OF THE DISTRICT; ACCEPTING AND APPROVING THE PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATE OF COSTS OF THE ENGINEERS OF THE VILLAGE IN CONNECTION WITH THE DISTRICT IMPROVEMENTS AND AUTHORIZING VILLAGE OFFICIALS TO ENTER INTO AND EXECUTE A CONTRACT FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENTS ON BEHALF OF THE DISTRICT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHAIRPERSON AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES (THE "VILLAGE BOARD") OF THE VILLAGE OF EAGLE, NEBRASKA (THE "VILLAGE") AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Village Board makes the following findings and determinations:

- a. Pursuant to Ordinance Nos. 2025-09 and 2025-10, adopted by the Village Board on October 20, 2025 ("Creation Ordinance"), the Village created Sidewalk Improvement District Nos. 2025-01 and 2025-02 (collectively, the "District") and authorized the construction and improvement of sidewalks within (i) F Street from 4th to 6th Street, and (ii) 4th Street from A St. to the Mopac Trail, all within the Village (as more fully described in the Creation Ordinance, the "Improvements"); and
- b. Pursuant to the Creation Ordinance, the Village Board called for a public hearing to be held on December 2, 2025 (the "Public Hearing") for the Village Board to determine the sufficiency of any written objections filed objecting to the creation of the District and the existence of the required facts and conditions relative to the creation of such District, and the Village Board ordered notice of the Public Hearing to be published as provided by law; and
- c. Notice of the creation of the District and notice of the Public Hearing was published once each week for two consecutive weeks, on November 6 and November 13, in *The Voice News*, a legal newspaper of general circulation in the Village; and
- d. As of the date of the Public Hearing, owners of record title representing 0% of the front footage of the property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in District No. 2025-01 and 9.48% of the front footage of the property directly abutting the Improvements to be made in District No. 2025-02 have filed written objections to the creation of such District; and
- e. The owners of record title to property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in the District who filed objections to the creation of such District do not represent more than 50 percent of the front footage of property directly abutting upon the Improvements to be made in the District; and

- f. The Village Board finds and determines that (i) objections to the creation of the District are insufficient to repeal the Creation Ordinance, and (ii) all required facts and conditions exist for the creation of the District.
- **Section 2**. The creation of the District and the Village Board's findings and determinations with respect to the construction of the Improvements are hereby ratified and affirmed.
- **Section 3.** The plans, specifications and estimates of cost of the engineers in connection with the construction of the Improvements in the District, which have heretofore been filed with the Village Board are accepted and approved.
- **Section 4**. This Resolution shall be in full force and take effect from and after its passage as provided by law.
